Nairn Local Place Plan Participation Statement

August 2023

Introduction

The engagement process will be managed and facilitated by a paid Nairn Local Place Plan Project Coordinator (tbc), and the Nairn LPP steering group which comprises volunteer representatives from NICE (LPP Lead Community Body), Nairn West and Suburban CC, Nairn River CC and Nairn BID with input from The Highland Council and PAS (Planning Aid Scotland). Rural Nairnshire and other neighbouring community councils may also join the steering group during the public engagement phase.

Initial funding for the 'pre engagement' stage has been provided by Nairn River Community Council - and The Highland Council has committed to fund a PAS Consultant from autumn 2023. NICE has an application pending to Highland Regeneration Fund/Community Led Local Development Fund - to support a paid coordinator and administrative costs for the LPP process from Oct 23. The aim is to produce a community-led Local Place Plan which identifies future priorities for the wider Nairn area (geography to be defined by local community). It will take account of previous consultations and other plans, strategies, and projects.

Inclusion is at the heart of the process. All publicity and information will be simple, clear and direct. As many people as possible living and working in Nairnshire area will be engaged with, using a range of engagement activities and opportunities, to seek as broad a range of ideas and opinions as possible, as outlined in this document. We will use targeted methods to reach underrepresented groups, to help make public participation inclusive. An email contact address <u>LPP@nicenairn.org.uk</u> is already in place with a dedicated LPP webpage <u>nicenairn.org.uk/lpp</u>. Once paid support staff are on board publicity materials will provide a named contact and phone no for people who are unable or unwilling to participate in events or online.

Special efforts will be made to reach out to 'seldom heard' voices including children and young people, young adults, older people and the farming community.

Council members and officers, Community Planning partners (e.g., HIE, HITRANS, NHS Highland, Forestry and Land Scotland and NatureScot) and the Scottish Government will be engaged as the process unfolds. Although led by community aspirations and incorporating community actions, the plan is also intended to influence other stakeholders' future investments, services, operations and policies.

Summary of engagement process

Stage 1 Pre Engagement- July - Sept 23

Aim : Engage community and introduce/raise awareness of LPP process

Initial public survey and LPP information online and on paper to encourage public input.

Visible Nairn LPP branded materials to encourage local ownership of LPP process.

Raise awareness of survey and LPP at summer community events, Riverside Park 'Big Lunch', Nairn Farmers' Show, Nairn Highland Games

Stage 2 - Priorities - Oct - Dec 23

Aim : Engage community on issues, aspirations and opportunities

Drop in events across Nairnshire area during afternoon/evening in public buildings, schools, pubs, churches etc

Targeted engagement with schools, youth groups, parent groups, lunch clubs, care homes, disability groups and other interest groups **Publicity** via posters, flyers, mail drops, social media, ebulletins, community/neighbourhood groups, youth ambassadors, word of mouth

Stage 3 Opportunities Dec 23- Feb 24

Aim: Share feedback from drop ins and translate aspirations into deliverable actions
